Dr. Edwards serves as a Senior Policy Advisor for Law Enforcement in the Office of Policy Development for the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), of the U.S. Justice Department. His portfolio consists of projects on use of force, law enforcement leadership, law enforcement public trust and confidence, matters of law enforcement/community prevention, specifically the use and effect of technology, major case/multi-jurisdiction investigations and law enforcement's role in public health emergencies.

Prior to joining BJA, Dr. Edwards served as Deputy Director and as a Senior Social Science Analyst in the Crime Control and Prevention Division of the Office of Research and Evaluation at the Justice Department's National Institute of Justice (NIJ). While at NIJ he managed a number of evaluations, specifically, the national evaluation of COPS; the national evaluation of Weed and Seed; a 10-city youth firearms violence initiative and the national assessment of 311/911 alternative call handling. Prior to NIJ, he served as a Senior Research Analyst in the Program Design and Development Section of the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) where he assisted in the design and development of COPS funding programs—COPS FAST and Troops to Cops.

Dr. Edwards came to federal service from a tenured faculty appointment at the University of Louisville's Department of Justice Administration and Southern Police Institute. He has held appointments at the University of Alaska, Anchorage; the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University; and the School of Criminal Justice at Michigan State University. Dr. Edwards received his graduate (Ph.D., 1985, MS, 1977) and undergraduate (B.S., 1970) education from the School of Criminal Justice at Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan.
