Cecelia Klingele returned to the University of Wisconsin Law School, her *alma mater*, as a Visiting Assistant Professor in 2009. She received her J.D. in 2005 with top academic honors (in fact, she was regarded so highly by the criminal justice faculty that she was enlisted to help teach courses while still a student). Following law school graduation, Klingele served as a law clerk to Chief Judge Barbara B. Crabb of the United States District Court for the Western District of Wisconsin, Judge Susan H. Black of the United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit, and Associate Justice John Paul Stevens of the United States Supreme Court. She previously served as a supervising attorney at the law school's Frank J. Remington Center and as an adjunct faculty member.

Professor Klingele's academic research focuses on criminal justice administration, and she continues to spend time talking with and observing the police to enhance her understanding of their function and its relationship to other dimensions of the criminal justice system. She is co-chair of the Academic Committee of the American Bar Association's Criminal Justice Section, and is an active member of the Section's Committee on Corrections.
