

Fredinal “Fred” P. Rogers



Fredinal P. Rogers is deputy chief of the U.S. Capitol Police, where he is Commanding Officer of the 1,180 sworn and civilian personnel in the Uniformed Services Bureau. That bureau includes the Capitol, House, Library, and Senate Divisions. He joined the U.S. Capitol Police in 1992 and has worked in nearly all its divisions. Rogers is highly regarded for his effectiveness in building teams, his communication skills, and his innovative approaches to improve the protection of the Congress.

Fred developed strategies to measure the success of his commands in qualitative terms rather than the typical and easier quantitative data collection approach. His efforts directly contributed to support of the Senate and House for Department security initiatives.

His accomplishments include establishing the Department's first Driving Under the Influence Sobriety Checkpoint and the Department's first community outreach Child Safety Seat Inspection Program. Rogers was promoted to the rank of Inspector at age 34 and assumed command of the Senate Division. There, he established the Division's first Inspector Advisory Committee to enhance the Division's ability to provide law enforcement and security operations to the Senate Office Buildings. In 2007, Deputy Chief Rogers assumed command of the Library of Congress Police. In this capacity, he was responsible for creating the business case, as well as managing the day-to-day operations of the Library of Congress Police pending the merger with the US Capitol Police. The merger of the two agencies had lingered for several years until Fred's assignment in 2007. He developed a vision for completion and brought key stakeholders together, resulting in a cost efficient, effective, unified anti-terrorism division.

Deputy Chief Rogers is a graduate of the FBI National Academy, the Senior Management Institute for Police, and the Institute for Law Enforcement Administration Management College. He holds a Bachelor's and Master's Degree in Management from Johns Hopkins University and an Executive Master's Degree in Leadership from Georgetown University.

Deputy Chief Rogers is married with 2 children. In his spare time, he enjoys reading and trips to his native island of St. Lucia.
